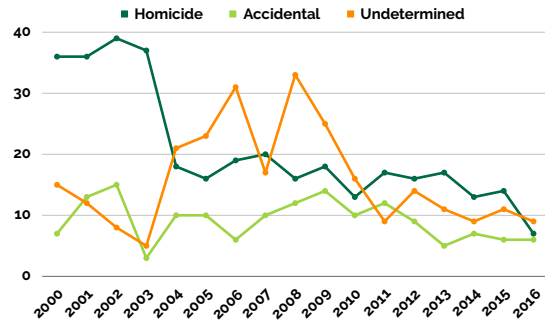
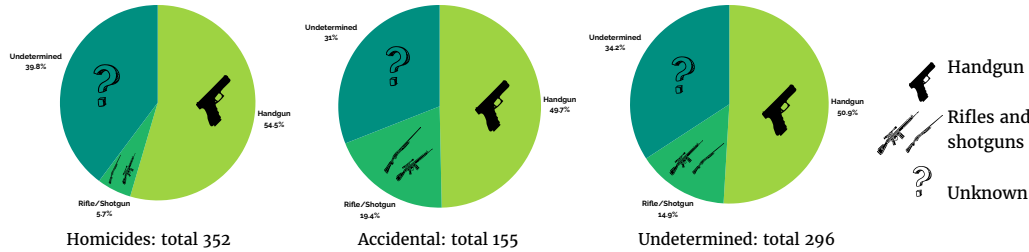




Evolution of homicides and accidents with firearms (2000-2016)¹

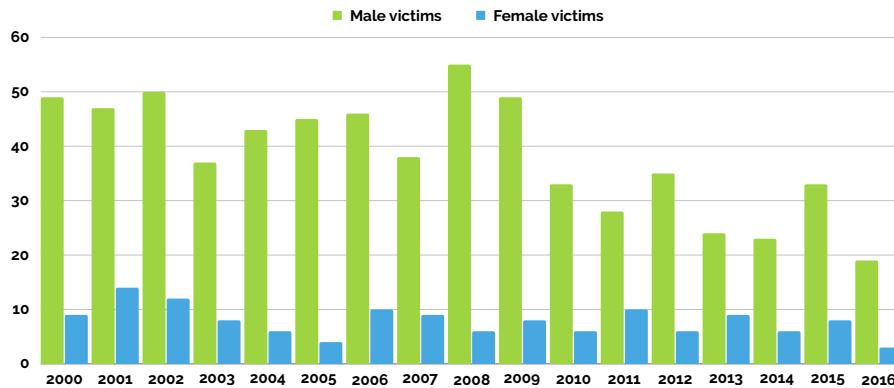

However, the scope will be further widened to include multiple perpetrators, "shootings that occur in the public and/or semi-public space, perpetrated by one offender and resulting in three or more randomly selected victims, with at least one fatality. The term victim refers to those fatally shot and those injured; however, it does not include the perpetrator". 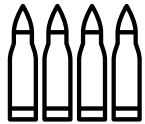


Seizures 2010-2012⁸

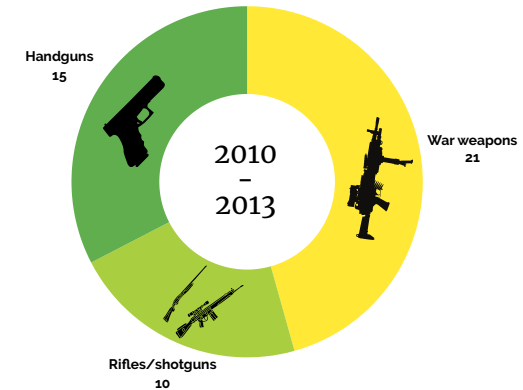

Trafficking



The Czech Republic is an origin and transit country for illegal firearms and ammunition.¹⁰

A 2021 study on the ballistic datasets of Denmark, Germany, Sweden and Switzerland found that the Czech Republic is the top manufacturer of ammunition used in shootings for these countries.¹¹



Czech groups have repeatedly been implicated in trafficking Flobert guns to the United Kingdom, Netherlands and Sweden.¹² However, since 2021, the adoption of the new legislation, which requires the registration of these types of weapons, has halted their trafficking outside the Czech Republic.¹³

Possession



In 2020 the right to bear arms for self defence was embedded into the Czech Republic's constitution.¹⁴



According to Czech police statistics, from 2016 to 2022, the registered number of firearms has seen a significant increase (825,927 to 1,006,945). A similar increase is observed in the number of the firearms licence holders (300,307 to 314,039).¹⁵
